Other good ones included, "If I'm Lightning then you must be McQueen" and "I must've gone fishing because you're the perfect catch."


State Runner Up!

After dominating wins in the regional semi-final and regional final against Lawton (77-5), and Decatur (62-17),the 3rd ranked Climax-Scotts/Martin Co-op team (CSM) competed in the MHSAA Team State quarterfinals Friday, 2/21 against 6th ranked Union City.

After getting off to a commanding 24-0 lead through 4 weight classes, CSM was in full control of the dual. They would go on to win the quarterfinals by a final score of 47-28, and would move on to the semifinals against the 2nd ranked St. Louis Sharks.

In a battle of the #2 and #3 teams in Division 4, it would be one that will be remembered for years to come. Through the first 5 matches both teams would exchange wins and the Sharks would be up 16-6 with 9 matches to go. However, from that point, CSM would go on to string out 4 straight wins with 2 earning bonus points, giving the team the lead 20-16 with 5 matches to go. CSM would then drop the next two matches both by decisions before Senior Samuel Bleeker got bonus points in a 10-0 win against his opponent, putting CSM back in the lead with a score of 24-22 with the final two matches to go.

The next match was a hard fought battle dropped by CSM, putting them in a 25-24 deficit with the last match remaining. It looked like this match would be St. Louis' match to lose, knowing they were sending out the 13th ranked 106 pound state qualifier. But CSM had total faith that their unranked, 106 pounder (but also regional qualifier) Jacinto Lopez could lead them to the promised land!

And he did just that! Pinning his opponent in 4:50, completing the stunning upset over the 2nd ranked St. Louis Sharks and sending his team to the Division 4 state finals against powerhouse Hudson.

This was CSM's first appearance in the Finals ever since becoming a co-op in 2015, and they had a tough task ahead of them with Hudson, the three-time defending state champions.

CSM would get out to an early 12-0 lead after the first two matches: one by pin fall and other by injury default. But then Hudson rolled out the hammers of their lineup and ended up winning the next 4 matches, all by bonus points, taking a commanding 21-12 lead through the first 6 matches.

However, CSM would answer, winning the next 2 matches by bonus points and tying the team state championship up at 21 a piece with 6 matches to go.

Unfortunately, Hudson would win the next 3 matches, putting the dual at a 35-21 score with 3 matches to go. Sadly, despite closing the gap in the final score, CSM's hopes of winning came to an end, losing by a final score of 45-25.

CSM gave the now 4-time team State Champions everything they had! They had a phenomenal season, ending with a 26-2 overall record!
