Team CSM sent 8 out of 14 wrestlers to the MHSAA Individual State Wrestling Finals February 28th - March 1st. Qualifying for state was Uriah Joostberns (113), Logan Gilbert (120), Cole Reitz (132), Jayce Ritchie (138), Haylen Buell (144), Jackson Bagwell (157), Jakub Tomyslak (165), and Samuel Bleeker (215). In the first round, Uriah, Logan, Jayce, Haylen and Sam each advanced to the quarterfinals.

Cole, Jack, and Jakub all lost hard fought battles in the first round but ended up losing to their opponents. In the second round, we had 3 advance to the semifinals with those wrestlers being Uriah, Logan, and Haylen, while both Sam and Jayce lost to the number one overall seed in the respective brackets.

In round 1 of the consolation side of the bracket, Cole was able to win his match and end up staying alive to be able to wrestle another match. On the other hand, the two seniors Jack and Jakub, sadly ended up losing their match and being knocked out of the tournament. Both had great seasons and good careers.

Sam and Jayce were able to bounce back and win their next match to become All-State in their weight class. In the semifinals, Uriah lost to the number one overall seed by tech fall. Logan ended up losing to the 3 seed 5-0. Haylen ended up winning his match by fall to advance to the State Championship final match.

For day 2, we had 5 wrestlers in the hunt for a medal and one eyeing his 2nd state championship. On the backside of the bracket, Uriah had an incredible day with a 5th place finish in the state as a freshman. Logan ended his high school career with a 3rd place finish. Jayce ended his high school career with a 5th place finish. Sam ended his high school career with a 7th place finish. In the finals, Haylen lost his match by fall, and finished his junior year with a 2nd place finish.



younger classmates? Hard work pays off. Anything you learn now might be useful down the road.




March Is Reading Month
